Instead, an Army buddy from his days on Corregidor comes after him. He is Brigadier General Otis Dewitt, now intelligence aid on General Douglas MacArthur's staff. In concert with the State Department, DeWitt has temporary orders drawn for Ingram to accompany him to Manila on the same plane as sixteen Japanese senior military and civilian diplomats. Over a swift two days, they negotiate with General MacArthur's staff, the terms for the instrument of surrender, soon to be signed in Tokyo Bay. DeWitt Promises Ingram that he will attend that ceremony. But DeWitt and the State Department have an ulterior motive. After Manila, they send Ingram on to Sakhalin Island to learn what can be done to defuse a Soviet attack on Hokkaido. Why me, asks Ingram? He groans when DeWitt tells him Edward Dezhnev is now a Captain Third Rank in the Soviet Navy. Moreover, Dezhnev is a brigade commander on Sakhalin and is responsible for laying siege to a Japanese hold-out in Toro, a natural jumping off place for an attack on Hokkaido. Ingram and Dezhnev were once friends. Maybe it can happen again, Dewitt explains. At the very least, Ingram might be able to gather intelligence on the Soviet's plans to attack Hokkaido. There is something else, DeWitt explains. Walter Boring, a Red Cross representative on the run from Harbin, China, has two crates of overwhelming photographic evidence of Japan's experiments on live human beings; experiments far worse than anything in Nazi Germany. Ingram is expected to return with those crates. But how can he when Boring is being protected by the Japanese garrison in Toro where Dezhnev and his brigade stand ready to overpower them at any moment? Thus Ingram's “friendship” with Dezhnev may be a key factor in securing Boring's release along with his crates. As his shipmates relax and prepare for their return to loved ones, Ingram must go the other way. Three weeks ago he was fighting the Japanese and the Soviets were supposed to be his friends. Now, he doesn't know who to trust.

Lastly, it provides readers with explanations of the various phenomena that arise when the mass flow rate is reduced and the compressor is driven to poor and noisy performance. Written for students, researchers and professionals who want to improve their understanding of the complex fluid flow behavior in centrifugal compressors, the thesis offers valuable practical insights into reducing the acoustic emissions of turbochargers.

Sedimentological models capture the processes and subsequent deposits that explain the distribution of facies within a depositional system. The first sedimentological models for deep-water depositional systems were portrayed as idealized shelf break to slope submarine basin sediment dispersal systems. These models were developed from ancient outcrop exposures (Mutti and Lucchi, 1972) and from the modern day seafloor (Normark, 1970, 1978). More recent model development has been based largely on observations from modern slope channels including the Amazon Channel (Pirmez and Imran; 2003), offshore West African (Abreu et al., 2003; Deptuck et al., 2003), and attempts at generalization from multiple studies (Mayall et al., 2006), as well as ancient outcrop studies (e.g., Brushy Canyon; Gardner et al., 2003). Concepts from these sedimentological models have been the principle foundation for development of quantitative geostatistical models. A geostatistical model adapts the conceptualization of facies distribution from the sedimentological model. This information is then coded into a three-dimensional, gridded computer model directly constrained to available data (i.e., wireline logs, core data, and seismic attributes). Geostatistical models developed for deep-water depositional systems have primarily focused on either sinuous channels confined by levees or erosional surfaces (e.g., Larue and Hovadik, 2006; Labourdette et al., 2007; Pycrc et al., 2008; McHargue et al., 2010; Sylvester et al., 2010) or basin-floor or overbank lobes associated with loss of confinement from sinuous channels (Pycrc et al., 2005; Wellner et al., 2006; Zhang et al., 2009). Although widely used, such geostatistical models have limited applicability in fitting all deep-water depositional systems, and cases exist that require modification of such models or creation of entirely new models. In this dissertation I show the importance of synthesizing sedimentological and geostatistical models based on observations from the data. The primary objectives of this dissertation are 1) to present methodologies to enable the creation of better sedimentological models from remote sensing data, and 2) to present a means to model depositional architectures for a system that cannot currently be captured with standard geostatistical modeling approaches. The main contributions are threefold. The first contribution, presented in Chapter 1, is a methodology designed to extract subseismic, lithologic information from inverted pre-stack seismic reflectivities. Also, in Chapter 1, the predictive power of this methodology is demonstrated on a dataset from the subsurface of the Molasse Basin in Upper Austria. Beyond this dissertation, Bernhardt et al. (in review) adopted the methodology to support the development of a more predictive sedimentological model for the same dataset. The second contribution, presented in Chapter 2, is a new approach for building predictive quantitative spatial models for a deep-water channel belt, in which sand deposition is controlled by mass-transport-deposit-topography. This methodology leverages sedimentological interpretations derived from subseismic, lithologic information as presented in Chapter 1 and the sedimentological work of Bernhardt et al. (in review). The final contribution of this dissertation is presented in two outcrop studies. Chapters 3 and 4 utilize extensive data collected from deep-water channel outcrops to build digital outcrop models. The model from Chapter 3 is used to demonstrate the predictive power of pre-stack seismic-reflectivity data in interpreting the large-scale architecture of a heterolithic deep-water channel system exposed in the sea cliffs along Blacks Beach near La Jolla, California. Finally, the outcrop modeling study presented in Chapter 4 presents a methodology to capture structural and stratigraphic uncertainty in outcrop observations in order to analyze the three-dimensional channel morphology of the Cerro
